Scope of Work Summary:

The project focuses on the use of certification agreements during Serious Animal Disease (SAD) incursions to facilitate ongoing trade in animal product commodities that are recognised by the World Organisation for Animal Health (WOAH) as "safe", or which have been otherwise been subjected to WOAH recognised risk mitigation treatments. The project will also build greater



alignment on the principles that need to be applied to develop and maintain internationally credible and WOAH consistent zones and compartments.

This initiative will provide training on the relevant WOAH standards, as well as the essential regulatory frameworks required for the credible implementation and certification of the various risk mitigations within the AANZFTA Parties' domestic systems. It will support the veterinary competent authorities of participating countries to maintain existing trade while appropriately mitigating risk associated with incursions of serious animal diseases.

Through this ToR, the RT4D Facility seeks a firm/organisation or technical expert (the Consultant) to support the design and delivery of project activities between January – December 2026. The Consultant will be responsible for the completion of the following outputs in close consultation and with the approval from the Project Proponent, RT4D Facility and the AANZFTA Sub-Committee on Sanitary and Phytosanitary Measures (SC-SPS):

- Survey of ASEAN Member States The survey will set a baseline of each ASEAN member state's current import and export certification requirements relating to serious animal diseases.
- 2. **First Virtual Workshop** The workshop will include an interactive virtual presentation and discussion of the survey results and relevant international standards.
- Case Study Development Three case studies will focus on good regulatory practices for SPS safe trade resilient to disease dynamics
- 4. Second Virtual Workshop The workshop will include the presentation of the case studies and let participating ASEAN member state officials visualise what a credible treatment and or the application of regionalisation looks like.
- 5. **Three-Day In-Person Workshop** The in-person workshop will bring together participants across ASEAN Member States to use the previous learning and the interactive group/peer environment to motivate each other to align their import and assurance requirements with international standards.
- 6. **Impact Survey and Project Reporting –** These deliverables will evaluate how effective the project was and provide possible recommendations on any further work to further the original objectives.



II. Background

2.1 Project Objectives

Aligning with objectives of the AANZFTA Sanitary and Phytosanitary Measures (SC-SPS) Sub-Committee's current strategic plan to: "Strengthen co-operation among the competent authorities of the parties which are responsible for matters covered by this chapter". The project's objectives are:

- To support the veterinary competent authorities of participating countries apply WTO SPS principles and WOAH standards that enable sate and resilient trade within the ASEAN region, even when the animal health status of one or more of the countries changes as result of the incursion of a serious animal disease (SAD) such as High Pathogenicity Avian Influenza, African Swine Fever, Lumpy Skin Disease, and Foot and Mouth Disease.
- To share expertise and experience, enhance international exposure, provide broad educational
 opportunities, cultivate enduring professional relationships among official veterinarians from
 ASEAN nations and AANZFTA Parties.
- To promote greater alignment and harmonization in the understanding and application of internationally recognised (WOAH) product risk mitigation and certification assurances and the application of the principles necessary to establish and maintain zones or compartments for existing trade across the broader region.

2.2 Intended Beneficiaries

The target beneficiaries of this project include the ASEAN parties' veterinary/animal health departments, and in particular the senior veterinary officers/directors overseeing both the approval and issuance of international trade assurances associated with disease risk mitigation and control activities administered by these departments.

2.3 Project Outcomes

The outcomes of the project are to:

- Assist ASEAN competent authorities to implement an internationally consistent, risk-based and trade faciliatory approach to manage safe trade in animal commodities for certain foreign/ serious animal diseases that significantly impact on trade in the region e.g. high pathogenicity avian influenza, African swine fever, lumpy skin disease and foot and mouth disease
- 2. Foster wider international experience, a broad learning opportunity and long-term relationships among official veterinarians from ASEAN Member States.
- Provide an opportunity across ASEAN to further align and harmonize understanding with respect to the relevant international standards so as to help facilitate trade within the region and further afield.



III. Scope of Services

The RT4D Facility is seeking a firm/organisation or technical consultant (the Consultant) to support the design and delivery of project activities between January – December 2026. The selected Consultant will be responsible for the scope of services outlined in the sections below.

3.1 Project Activities

Activity 1 - Enrolment of ASEAN Member States Contact Points

The consultant will be responsible for forming a highly engaged Reference Group of officials representing ASEAN Member States responsible for SPS measures for trade in animals and animal products. This will involve sending out a letter to the Chief Veterinary Office / head of import and export (animal health) to each of the ASEAN member states introducing the project and consultant and requesting the official to nominate both a contact point and two senior officials to attend the virtual and in-person sessions. The consultant will need to follow this letter up with other communications to ensure at least 80% of ASEAN is engaged.

Activity 2 – Development of Reference Group Survey of ASEAN members

The survey contributes to project objectives by setting a baseline of each ASEAN member state's current import and export certification requirements relating to the listed serious animal disease to help inform the development of the training material and the final analysis of whether the project resulted in any changed policies and practices.

The Consultant will be responsible for producing the survey, which should result in a detailed inventory of the current meat, dairy, and byproduct import/export requirements for each ASEAN member state as they relate to the listed serious animal disease to a level that allows appropriate comparison with the relevant international standards. The project proponent should be consulted on the survey design.

Activity 3 – First Virtual Workshop

The Consultant will be responsible for planning and delivering a virtual workshop that includes an interactive virtual presentation and discussions of the survey results and relevant international WOAH standards. The workshop contributes to project objectives by allowing participation countries to discuss how their standards are relative to their neighbours and how hard or easy it may be to bring their requirements more in line with the relevant international standards. The virtual workshop will actively engage all of the surveyed ASEAN member states, set them up to positively think about possible changes and prepare them to attend the next virtual session, where international best practice case studies will be presented. The project proponent should be consulted on the results of the survey and how the consultant intends on presenting them.

Following workshop delivery, the Consultant will be responsible for developing a Workshop Report following a standardised template and AISP Monitoring, Evaluation and Learning (MEL) requirements.

Activity 4 - Case Study Development

The case studies contribute to project objectives by demonstrating what best international practice looks like with respect to the application of WOAH recognised treatments inside an appropriate assurance mechanism so that the participants gain confidence in the efficacy of such treatments



and understand what they may need to do to provide assurances to each other that treatments are being credibly and reliably applied.

The consultant will be responsible for developing three case studies: (i) two that focus on the most relevant trade food commodities and (ii) one that focuses on a successful regional or containment zone being established that allowed for existing trade to continue / recommence after an incursion of a serious animal disease and change of country status.

The project proponent should be consulted initially on the proposed on the topics and subsequently on the proposed versions of the case studies to be presented.

Activity 5 – Second Virtual Workshop

The Consultant will be responsible for planning and delivering a second virtual workshop designed to let participating ASEAN Member States' officials visualise what a credible treatment and or the application of regionalisation looks like, fostering confidence in the acceptability of these for imports and furthering knowledge on how they could implement something similar for their exports. A key workshop component will be to ensure that there is good knowledge and understanding of the proportionately lesser relative associated with recognising zones for processed commodities as opposed to live animal or germplasm trade.

The case studies (prepared under Activity 4) will be presented at the workshop. The project proponent should be consulted initially on the proposed on the topics and subsequently on the proposed versions of the case studies to be presented.

Following workshop delivery, the Consultant will be responsible for developing a Workshop Report following standardised template and AISP MEL requirements.

Activity 6 – In-Person Workshop

The Consultant will be responsible for the development of materials, delivery, facilitation, and reporting for an in-person workshop. The in-person workshop will be held in **Jakarta, Indonesia** and will bring together participants across ASEAN Member States and use the previous learning and the interactive group / peer environment to motivate all participants to further align their import and assurance requirements with the relevant international standards and the other more progressive member states.

The Consultant will be responsible for the delivery of a 2.5 day in-person workshop, providing/ utilising appropriate training material on best practices to facilitate SPS sage and resilient trade, drawing on the learnings, materials and experience from the survey and the two virtual workshops; and producing a Workshop Report—following a standardised template and in line with AISP MEL requirements—to be provided back to all attendees, contact points and the offices of the CVOs of each ASEAN member state.

Workshop logistics and event management will be managed by the RT4D Facility with support from an Event Organiser (EO). The Consultant will be expected to work closely with the EO in the organisation and delivery of the workshop.

The project proponent is to be consulted on the agenda, training material and attendance, anticipated contributions from New Zealand and Australian SMEs, and the Workshop Report prior to submission to ASEAN Member States.



Activity 7 - Impact Survey and Project Reporting

The impact survey and final report will evaluate how effective the project was and provide possible recommendations on any further work to further the original objectives.

The Consultant will be responsible for the development of the impact survey and follow up with each ASEAN State 6-8 weeks after the in-person course to see what changes they have made or are intending to make because of the project.

The Consultant will also be responsible for the delivery of the following reports to provide the AANZFTA SC-SPS with oversight of the project:

- **6-month Progress Report** shared with SC-SPS for consideration and approval by June 2026. The progress report should assess progress against project objectives and delivery of outputs. The reports are also an opportunity to reassess stakeholder alignment with project objectives and any challenges or risks to successful project completion (along with mitigating strategies).
- Project Completion Report shared with SC-SPS for consideration and approval by November 2026. The completion report should assess achievement of project objectives and delivery of outputs. The report can also make recommendations and/or suggestions regarding any AANZFTA Party challenges and further opportunities in line with project objectives.

The project proponent needs to be consulted on the design of the follow up survey along with the results, and the consultant should consult RT4D, the ASEAN Secretariat and the project proponent on the requirements for the 6-Month Progress Report and Project Completion Report.



A. Project Work Plan

Working closely with the Proponent and the RT4D team, the Consultant is expected to deliver the outlined deliverables in line with the work plan and timeline below.

The support from the selected Consultant, will be undertaken over a continuous effective period of **11 calendar months** with an estimated **55 person days** of professional services. Actual time will be agreed in negotiation with the selected Consultant. Work will commence immediately after contract signing.

IV. Gender Equality Disability and Social Inclusion

The Consultant will be responsible for ensuring that project implementation embeds Gender Equality, Disability and Social Inclusion (GEDS) in line with the requirements set in this section. The Consultant should consult and work closely with the RT4D Manager and RT4D GEDSI Manager in ensuring that the project implementation addresses these requirements.

4.1 GEDSI Dimension of the Project

The project is technically oriented and does not include GEDSI focused objectives or outcomes. However, the project will consider GEDSI where relevant during the development and delivery of key activities. These include:

- If relevant to project objectives and outcomes, technical materials including the case studies and workshop materials consider how SPS certification practices and relevant international standards for animal and animal products may affect diverse populations differently based on gender, age, and socioeconomic factors (e.g. women led businesses, smallholders and other disadvantaged groups).
- Promote gender-balanced and inclusive participation across project's activities.
- Applying principes of accessibility and inclusivity in the events and communications products or learning materials that it will organise and produce.
- Collecting gender and disability disaggregated data form all activities.

4.2 GEDSI Dimensions of the Sector

Animal health and animal health emergency programs may overlook how different interventions affect diverse populations based on gender and other socioeconomic factors. There are several gender considerations relevant to animal health emergency preparedness and response. These include:¹

Women may face specific challenges within the veterinary industry including: (i) cultural
expectations may perpetuate gender disparities, (ii) access to leadership positions and
decision-making roles. Addressing these challenges by providing equal access to opportunities
is necessary to foster an inclusive and supportive environment.

Approaches to animal health and animal health emergencies that include gender inclusive approaches can reduce risk, increase protection and enhance responses. Where relevant to project objectives and outcomes, this project will apply a GEDSI lens across its outputs to understand the sector's GEDSI dimensions and emphasise the importance of promoting gender equality and considering diverse population characteristics during the design and implementation of animal health emergency policies and standards for animals and animal products.

4.3 Approach to GEDSI Mainstreaming

In line with the approach outlined above, the project will mainstream GEDSI during the development and delivery of key activities through the following actions:

• Ensuring the design and implementation of the survey and both the virtual and in person workshops appropriately consider and ensure the contribution of female official veterinarians

- Where appropriate, ensure the role and needs of women, smallholders and other vulnerable populations are considered in any recommendations emanating out of the work.
- The development technical materials for the virtual workshops and case studies, where relevant to project objectives and outcomes, will consider GEDSI learnings from the survey and existing resources such as the WOAH and FAO.
- If relevant to project objectives and outcomes, the capacity building workshops may include a space to identify and discuss GEDSI aspects relevant to the establishment of zones and compartments in ASEAN and associated SPS certification standards. This approach can provide participants with an opportunity to reflect on their own experiences and share thoughts on how to embed equity and inclusion in the sector.
- All project events will encourage a gender-balanced participation and open to the participation of people with disabilities. The project will actively encourage nominating authorities to put forward qualified female candidates
- The project will encourage representation in delivery and facilitation and will aim for gender balance among workshop facilitators and presenters and ensure facilitators model inclusive teaching approaches that encourage participation.
- All the learning materials and communications products will follow accessibility principles.
- The project will collect gender and disability disaggregated data from all activities.

V. Communications, Media, and Business Engagement

The Consultant will support the RT4D Facility in meeting any Communications and Media objectives through the course of the Project. All reports and materials should be produced to a high quality in line with RT4D Branding Guidelines.

The Consultant is expected to adhere to following RT4D guidelines as required:

- i. Employ RT4D Branding guidelines, templates and logos in all project documentation (e.g. reports, PPTs, invitations).
- ii. Collecting images of the workshop for website and social media promotion.
- iii. RT4D Banner and RT4D brand on physical materials shared.

External Communications and Media component of this Project will be a key component of most project activities. The Consultant will be expected to respond to any reasonable requests and inputs from the RT4D Facility, which may include but will not be limited to project updates and requested written inputs.

In addition, the Consultant is expected to manage the implementation of the activity so that it adheres to communications and business engagement objectives as outlined below.

5.1 Communicating the Benefit of the AANZFTA

This project directly supports the communication of AANZFTA's benefits by demonstrating how regional cooperation in both the acceptance of international standards and associated certification, can strengthen animal health systems, safeguard trade, and build long-term resilience. The project's focus on certification, zoning, compartmentalisation, and product treatment directly supports the AANZFTA's goals of facilitating trade and enhancing transparency in SPS measures.

The outcomes of the project if applied should increase the ability for the Parties to demonstrate the advantages of the AANZFTA to their populations through allowing better continuity of supply chains and employment.



a. Clarity of Message

The project will clearly articulate its purpose in all communications and training materials. This clarity will help stakeholders understand how the project contributes to greater certainty for safe trade and stronger biosecurity across the region.

b. Alignment with Objectives

All communications will align with the project's objectives: facilitating trade while protecting health, increasing transparency in SPS regulations, and enhancing implementation of international standards. Messaging will reinforce how these outcomes support AANZFTA's broader economic cooperation goals.

c. Call to Action / Follow-up

Following the workshop, there will be follow-up activities to monitor progress among ASEAN Member States in incorporating the recognition of relevant international standards (WOAH recommendations) into their import and export certification requirements. This will help ensure that the workshop leads to practical implementation and sustained regional alignment in SPS measures.

A final report and debrief will be shared with participants and stakeholders, summarising key learnings, outcomes, and next steps. This will include recommendations for ongoing collaboration and implementation of best practices.

d. External Communications

Key messages and outcomes will be adapted for public dissemination, including a summary suitable for RT4D digital channels and potential media releases. These communications will highlight the value of regional cooperation under AANZFTA and showcase New Zealand's leadership in promoting science-based trade solutions.

5.2 Engagement, Building Relationships and Facilitating Feedback from Businesses

While the primary focus of this project is on building regulatory capacity among ASEAN Member States, its objectives and outcomes are designed to indirectly support business engagement and feedback in several keyways:

- Improved clarity and predictability for businesses: By enhancing understanding and implementation of certification related to safe commodities, treatments and zones the project helps create more transparent and consistent SPS measures. This benefits businesses by reducing uncertainty and facilitating smoother trade in animal products.
- Foundation for future public-private dialogue: The project will equip regulators with the tools and knowledge to better engage with industry stakeholders on SPS issues. This includes being able to explain certification requirements and international standards more clearly to exporters, importers, and producers.
- Business-relevant outcomes: Outputs such as training materials, case studies, and implementation guidance can be adapted for use in industry outreach, helping businesses understand how to comply with new or evolving SPS requirements.
- Follow-up monitoring and feedback: As part of the post-workshop follow-up, Parties will be
 encouraged to engage with their domestic industries to assess how international standards are



- being reflected in certification processes. This creates an opportunity for businesses to provide feedback on practical challenges and opportunities.
- Potential for future dissemination: While this project does not directly include private sector engagement, its outcomes may be shared through future communications products or events that involve industry stakeholders, helping to communicate the benefits of AANZFTA and regional SPS cooperation.

VI. Monitoring & Evaluation

The project's success will be measured against its ability to measure output and outcomes. The Consultant will be responsible for supporting the RT4D Facility in meeting key MEL requirements and templates during the delivery of the project in line with the table of indicators below. This will include, but not limited to:

- 1. Participant registration forms (online).
